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Lighthouse Academy's Student Writing Contest

Bill Cooper is a familiar face to the students at Lighthouse Academy at Newburg. Not only does Bill sit on the Lighthouse Promise Inc. Board of Directors as Legal Counsel, but he is a passionate advocate for children reading.

Inspired after the tragedy of Louisville's own, Breonna Taylor, Bill decided he wanted to invite Lighthouse Academy students to write about a person, event, or even company who was important to Black history. "I wanted to show the kids two things. One, every person has courage and two, every person has a choice," Bill said. Bill has donated a bookshelf of books about Black History to Lighthouse Academy. Bill and Cynthia Overall, Director of Operations and Student Services, hold a writing contest for all students to participate in at least once a semester. Bill reads every essay and grades them according to a five-point system. First to third place winnings earn cash prizes as incentives.

This February, fifteen students participated in the contest. Lighthouse and friends want to congratulate all students who participated. Special congratulations to our winners:

- First Place Winner: Lily
 - Lily wrote about Claudette Colvin, 15, who refused to give up her seat on a segregated bus pre Rosa Parks.
- Second Place Winner: Kandace
 - Kandace's article focused on the great civil rights activist, Dr. Martin Luther King.
- Third Place Winner: Jaslene
 - Jaslene wrote about George Washington Carver. Carver is a world-famous black scientist whose work impacted agricultural techniques and crops.
